

## Lieutenant Colonel Marshall Spring Howe

Charter Member of Rocky Mountain Lodge No. 205 A.F.&A.M.

Marshall Spring Howe was born June 12, 1804, (listed as 12 January 1804 in the General Catalogue of Non-Graduates of Bowdoin College<sup>1</sup>) in Standish, Maine, then part of Massachusetts. His parents, Ebenezer Howe (1773-1841) and Catherine Spring (1780-1860), had two other children, Greenleaf Howe (1807-1872) and Albion Parris Howe(1817-1897)<sup>2</sup>

Young Marshall applies to the Military Academy at West Point New York on January 7, 1822, recommended by Maine Governor Albion Keith Parris. At age 19, on February 27, 1823<sup>3</sup>, he is accepted to the Academy and begins classes on July 1, 1823<sup>4</sup>. He graduates 62<sup>nd</sup> in his class on July 1, 1827. Howe then applied to Bowdoin College Medical School in Maine during 1828 but does not complete the course.

While on summer leave from his classes, he is initiated at Harmony Lodge No. 38, located in Gorham Maine on July 27, 1825. A note on the records mentioned that he is advanced (ad) on June 2, 1828<sup>5</sup>

Shortly after the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons are established by President Andrew Jackson on 23 May 1836, Howe volunteers and is commissioned a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant. During the Second Seminole War, 1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant Howe is stationed in Piscalata, Florida starting in June 1837, as assistant adjutant with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons<sup>6</sup>, by 1839 he is promoted to Captain.



Major Howe and the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons are attached to Major General Twiggs command during July 1848 at East Pascagoula, Mississippi. Camp Jefferson Davis is established in July, composed of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons, 1<sup>st</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, and 5<sup>th</sup> infantry units. He is on leave September 11 through October 20, 1848 and may be at home in Maine after the birth of his son Lucien Howe on September 18, 1848<sup>7</sup>.

On February 20, 1849, Major Howe is assigned as a member of a Special Court Marshall in Austin Texas, Special Order No. 20. Special Order No. 22 dated March 24, 1849, Galveston Texas, orders Major Howe to New Mexico<sup>8</sup> to participate in another hearing.

On 8 Sep 1851 Major Marshall S. Howe commanding the 2nd U.S. Dragoons, establishes a U.S. Army post on the west bank of the Rio Grande near Valverde New Mexico. Created to control hostile Indians and to protect travel routes, called Fort Conrad (1851-1854),<sup>9</sup> it is located in Socorro County, named for Charles M. Conrad, Secretary of War (1850-1853). Major Howe is relieved of this command during April 1853<sup>10</sup> and is ordered to Fort Leavenworth.

November 28, 1856, Major Howe, in command of companies D and K of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons arrives at the newly established Fort Randall<sup>11</sup>, the site for the fort, located on the south side of the Missouri River in South Dakota, was selected by Colonel William S. Harney. The fort served as a strategic site on the river to defend two lines of transportation and maintain peace between American Indians and white settlers, as well as among the tribes themselves<sup>12</sup>. They remained garrisoned at the fort until December of 1856.

By the end of July 1856, when the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons, under the command of Brevet General Harney are ordered back to Fort Leavenworth, Major Howe along with several companies of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons are ordered on detached duty to Lawrence Kansas to patrol the frontier.<sup>13</sup>

In late 1857, in response to growing hostilities between federal authorities and Mormon settlers in Utah, a battalion of the 2nd Dragoons under the command of Col. William S. Harney at Fort Leavenworth Kansas was ordered west and marched to Fort Bridger, where they wintered. Early in the spring of 1858 the march continued and on June 26 the Army including the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons, marched through the streets of Salt Lake City and settled for three days west of the city on the Jordan River (Jordan Camp). The march then continued southwest where they bivouacked at West Creek Camp for eight days, before again proceeding south establishing a camp on the west bank of the upper Jordan River, Saratoga Camp. Three days later, they marched into Cedar Valley, to the mouth of West Canyon where they established the camp now referred to as "Old Camp Floyd". The army spent 60 days there, July 8 through September 8, 1858. Lt. Colonel Marshall S. Howe is the acting regimental Commander of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons, when the combined units proceeded to Fairfield and established Camp Floyd<sup>14</sup>.

Muster Rolls from Camp Floyd starting in December 1858 list Companies A, B, C, E, G and H as well as the staff officers present.<sup>15</sup> It is noted that Lt. Colonel Marshall S. Howe has been in command of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons since August 9, 1858.

Sometime over the next few months the petition is drafted and submitted to the Grand Lodge of Missouri requesting to form a new Lodge at Camp Floyd. As noted, Brother Howe is one of the signers<sup>16</sup>.

On May 28, 1859, when Special Order No. 140 is drafted giving permission to construct an adobe building to be used by Rocky Mountain Lodge No. 205, it appears that Col. Howe was one of the requesters as noted on the copy of the special orders posted<sup>17</sup>.

Lt. Colonel Howe and the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons remain at Camp Floyd for the next couple of years. The five companies under his command are dispatched throughout the territory to guard the territorial governor or to address problems between local Native Americans and wagon trains traveling west on many of the trails that cross the Utah Territory.

On August 1, 1859, it is reported to the Territorial Governor that a wagon train traveling west on the California Road has been attacked by a band of Shoshone. A number of civilians are killed, the wagons plundered, and horses taken. As a result, Company G, 2nd Dragoons, commanded by Lieutenant Ebenezer Gay and Lieutenant Thomas J. Berry. commanding Company A, 2nd Dragoons are dispatched north to Box Elder (Brigham City) to capture the Shoshone involved<sup>18</sup>. On August 13<sup>th</sup> the soldiers along with a guide track those responsible to a canyon off the road to Cache Valley and a skirmish ensues where approximately 20 Shoshone are killed, and the same number taken prisoner.

During May of 1860, Lt. Colonel Howe is relieved of his command to take charge of units traveling north to the Oregon Trail to protect travelers going west. He is dispatched up north until the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons are recalled east during the outbreak of the Civil War.

As the units at Camp Floyd withdrew back east Colonel Howe is ordered to New Mexico and joins the troops at Paraje, New Mexico, then under the command of Captain George M Howland. He is attached to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Cavalry and later the 3<sup>rd</sup> Cavalry.

On June 7, 1866, the Fifty-seventh USCT departed Fort Smith as the first of three columns. Marching westward into the Indian Territory, often along the Canadian River, the regiment primarily performed pioneer duty. On July 9, they camped at the ruins of Fort Cobb. On July 12, Commander Colonel Harwood got lost during a buffalo hunt and was feared killed by Comanche.

In Harwood's absence, the regiment continued with the expedition under Colonel Marshall S. Howe of the Third U.S. Cavalry. Following the Santa Fe Road, they reached Fort Bascom near the Colorado River by August 5 and arrived on August 13 at Fort Union, commanded by Colonel Kit Carson. While in New Mexico, the regiment's companies served by detachment at Forts Union, Sumner, and Stanton. Ordered to Fort Leavenworth on September 24, 1866, they arrived on October 29.

With a military career spanning nearly 30 years Colonel Marshall S. Web musters out of active duty and is placed on the retired rolls during late 1866. He moves to Jefferson County Kentucky after retiring.

On October 21, 1868, Colonel Marshall S. Howe, divorced from his first wife Anna T. Cleland, married Almedia Price in Louisville, Kentucky<sup>19</sup> and along with her two daughters from a previous marriage, the family settles in the area.<sup>20</sup>

Colonel Marshall S. Howe died at home in Harrodsburg Kentucky on December 8, 1878<sup>21</sup>. He is buried at Springhill Cemetery in Harrodsburg alongside his wife Almedia.<sup>22</sup>

There were many tributes, one of the most notable appeared in the Army, Navy and Air Force Register<sup>23</sup>; "As an officer, he was characterized by strict morality, stern integrity and a conscientious and thorough performance of every military duty. He was never known to shirk any responsibility that properly devolved upon him; nor did he ever fail to render a prompt and cheerful obedience to the legal orders of his military leaders..."
